November 4, 2016

CITY COUNCIL

Major actions taken by the Council at its regular meeting of November 2, 2016 include:

- ❖ Received the 2016 Housing Monitoring Report.
- ❖ Introduced and held a first reading of an ordinance amending a lease agreement with Pacific Grove Golf Links, LLC, an affiliate of CourseCo, Inc. for maintenance and operations of the Pacific Grove Golf Links, and directed that a summary of a proposed ordinance be published as approved by the City Attorney.

COMMUNITY AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Local Coastal Program Update. The Planning Commission discussed the fourth draft of the Local Coastal Program Land Use Plan and the third draft of the Implementation Plan at a Regular Meeting on November 3, 2016. The item was continued to a second meeting on November 17, 2016. Once a recommendation is made by the Planning Commission, the Local Coastal Program will be brought before the City Council, anticipated to be scheduled in early 2017, for approval and subsequent submission to the Coastal Commission for anticipated certification.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Daylight Savings Time and Smoke Detectors. The Monterey Fire Department would like to remind everyone that on Sunday, November 6, 2016 Daylight Saving Time ends, so be sure to move your clocks back one hour. This is also a perfect opportunity to check your Smoke Detectors and Carbon Monoxide (CO) alarms to ensure they are operating properly, and to replace batteries in units that do not have non-replaceable 10-year batteries.

Every year in the United States, thousands of people lose their lives in residential fires. Most fire victims die as a result of inhalation of smoke and toxic gases, not from burns. A properly installed and maintained smoke detector is one of the most effective devices in your home that can alert you and your family to a fire, 24 hours a day seven days a week. 
Residential Fire. On October 30, 2016 at approximately 9:00 PM the Monterey Fire Department was on scene of a fallen tree into power lines when they heard a loud noise near their location. They investigated the area on San Carlos just south of 12th in Carmel-by-the-Sea and found a structure on fire. The incident was immediately reported to dispatch so that additional engines could be coordinated to the scene. A portion of the home was engulfed in flames and the fire was initially attacked from outside of the building due to limited access to the interior. An Incident Command was set up to control and direct the scene while ventilation holes were cut in the roof to release smoke from the building in order to gain entry. A search of the building found no persons. The cause of the fire is inconclusive.

Put the alarm back on the ceiling or wall if it is less than 10 years old.



A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat and fire.



Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.



If the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside. Go to your outside meeting place.



Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement. Larger homes may need more alarms. For the best protection, make sure all smoke alarms are interconnected. When one sounds, they all sound.



Call the fire department from a cellphone or a neighbor's phone. Stay outside until the fire department says it's safe to go back inside.

Monterey Fire Department would like to remind you that smoke alarms should be replaced every 10 years. Make sure you know how old all the smoke alarms are in your home. To find out how old a smoke alarm is, look at the date of manufacture on the back of the alarm; the alarm should be replaced 10 years from that date.

According to National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), the risk of dying in a home fire is cut in half when there are working smoke alarms. While research shows that most U.S. homes have at least one smoke alarm, almost two-thirds of home fire deaths result from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

Smoke alarms should be installed in every bedroom, outside every sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement. Large homes may require more alarms. Test your smoke alarms every month, and replace all smoke alarms in your home every 10 years.

The newly-released NFPA report "[Smoke Alarms in U.S. Home Fires](#)" reveals data from 2009-2013 that underscores the importance of working smoke alarms. Information includes:

- An average of 940 deaths per year occurred in homes with no smoke alarms, while an additional 510 occurred in homes with smoke alarms that failed to operate. This accounts for 59 percent of all home fire deaths.
- The death rate in homes without alarms or without working ones was 1.18 deaths per 100 reported fires, compared to only 0.53 in homes with working devices.
- Alarms operated correctly 87 percent of the time in reported fires large enough to activate them. Power source problems are the leading cause of smoke alarm failures. Hardwired devices were more likely to operate than those that were battery-powered.
- The lowest death rate was seen in homes that contained both hardwired smoke alarms and sprinklers.
- When homes did have working smoke alarms, victims were more likely to have been located in the place of origin, to be 65 or older, to have a physical disability or to have tried to fight the fire themselves.

Testing Smoke Alarms

- Smoke alarms should be maintained according to manufacturer's instructions.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month using the test button.
- Make sure everyone in the home understands the sound of the smoke alarm and knows how to respond.
- Follow manufacturer's instructions for cleaning to keep smoke alarms working well. The instructions are included in the package or can be found on the internet.
- Smoke alarms with non-replaceable 10-year batteries are designed to remain effective for up to 10 years. If the alarm chirps, warning that the battery is low, replace the entire smoke alarm right away.
- Smoke alarms with any other type of battery need a new battery at least once a year. If that alarm chirps, warning the battery is low, replace the battery right away.
- When replacing a battery, follow manufacturer's list of batteries on the back of the alarm or manufacturer's instructions. Manufacturer's instructions are specific to the batteries (brand and model) that must be used. The smoke alarm may not work properly if a different kind of battery is used.



STREET ACCESS AND PARKING FOR THE HALF MARATHON AND RELATED EVENTS Saturday, November 12 and Sunday, November 13

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 12 – 3K & 5K

Parking Restrictions:

- **No parking** from 4 a.m. to 10 a.m. along the waterfront on Ocean View Blvd. between 17th (Lovers Point area) and the ocean end of Lighthouse Avenue at the Pacific Grove Golf Links.

Street Access:

- During the course of the event, from approximately 6 a.m.-10 a.m. the road will be closed in both traffic directions on the waterfront on Ocean View Blvd. and Sunset Drive from Lovers Point to Pt. Pinos. **Residents who live along Ocean View that may need to exit during the race should pre-park a vehicle on a nearby side street for egress.**
- Residents along Mermaid Street and guests of Borg's Motel and Lovers Point Inn may exit and enter on Mermaid Street at Sea Palm. Vehicles will be allowed to drive against the stated direction in order to exit the area.

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 13 – Half Marathon

Parking Restrictions:

- **No parking on the entire portion of the waterfront from 4 a.m. to 10 a.m.** This includes both sides of the street on Ocean View Blvd. and Sunset Drive from Eardley Avenue to Asilomar.
- **No parking** on the westbound side of Lighthouse Ave. between Fountain and Congress; on either side of the street on Fountain Avenue between Ocean View and Lighthouse; on 17th Street from Ocean View to Central; and on Central Ave. from Congress to 17th Street from 4 a.m. to 9 a.m.

Street Access:

- During the course of the event, from approximately 6 a.m.-10 a.m., the road will be closed in both traffic directions on the waterfront on Ocean View Blvd. and Sunset Drive from Eardley to Sunset Drive near the Fishwife. **Residents who live along Ocean View that may need to exit during the race should pre-park a vehicle on a nearby side street for egress.**
- Residents along Mermaid Street and guests of Borg's Motel and Lovers Point Inn may exit and enter (cautiously) on Mermaid Street at Sea Palm only. Vehicles will be allowed to drive against the stated direction in order to exit the area.
- Between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 8:45 a.m., residents and visitors between Fountain and 16th from Ocean View to Lighthouse Avenue, will be allowed to exit the area in one location only. The exit area is located at the intersection of Central Avenue and Fountain Avenue (by the Library). Please note: there will likely be delays in exiting this area due to the number of runners crossing at the peak time. **NOTE: 17th St. residents will have only pedestrian access from their homes between these hours.**
- Between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m., residents on 18th, 19th and Caledonia Streets between Jewell and Central Avenues will need to exit via Union or Jewell and leave the area on Pacific Ave. Residents on one-way streets will be allowed to drive against the stated direction in order to exit the area.

SUNSET DRIVE AND ASILOMAR AREA RESIDENTS' INFORMATION

During the course of the event, from approximately 6:00 a.m.-10 a.m. on Sunday, November 13th, traffic flow on Sunset Drive below Asilomar Blvd will be restricted to vehicles wishing to visit the Beachcomber Inn and Asilomar Conference Grounds. A Pacific Grove Police Department officer will be assigned to the intersection of Sunset and Asilomar Blvd to assure access is maintained to the motel and conference grounds. **Residents who live on Sunset Drive between Asilomar Blvd. and Lighthouse needing to leave during the race should pre-park a vehicle on a nearby side street (Lighthouse, Jewell Avenue, Arena or Pico).**

Veterans Day Weekend Ramp Closure for Holman Highway 68 Roundabout Construction

MONTEREY COUNTY – Construction of the Holman Highway 68 Roundabout will require **the full closure of the southbound Highway 1 off-ramp to Holman Highway 68 over the Veterans Day weekend. The ramp will be closed starting on Thursday, November 10 at 7 p.m. and reopen on Monday, November 14 at 6 a.m.**

- Emergency vehicles will have full access at all times.
- The CHP will assist with the closure.
- Drivers going to Holman Highway 68 from southbound Highway 1 will be required to continue south and detour to Ocean Avenue.
- **Motorists can expect delays of up to 20 minutes.**

The temporary closure is required for crews to reconstruct the off-ramp so that the ramp will conform to the design of the future roundabout.




