Special Municipal Election, April 19, 2016 – Measure X. A Special Municipal Election for the City of Pacific Grove was held on Tuesday, April 19, 2016. Voters were asked to vote on the following measure:

City of Pacific Grove
(MAJORITY VOTER APPROVAL REQUIRED)
Measure X

“Shall the Pacific Grove Municipal Code be amended to add Section 23.31.025 to change the zoning designation at the American Tin Cannery Site, located in Pacific Grove on Assessor Parcels (APN) 006-231-001, 006-234-004, 006-234-005, and the portion of Sloat Street between Eardley Avenue and Dewey Street, from Visitor Commercial (C-V) and Heavy Commercial (C-2) to Visitor Commercial (C-V-ATC) to re-establish hotels as a permissible land use?”

The Registrar of Voters from the Monterey County Elections Office posted a semi-final official summary report as of 4/19 at 10:45 PM with the following results:

Measure X

Yes 2,247 59.70%

No 1,517 40.30%

Total 3,764

As of April 20, 2016 at 12:00 PM, the Registrar of Voters (ROV) further reported that 1200 additional ballots/envelopes remained left to process. These additional ballots/envelopes were from various sources, including provisional and vote by mail ballots received at polling places and at the Monterey County Elections Department Office. Additionally, the Monterey County Elections Department will receive and count ballots through today (Friday, April 22, 2016) **IF** they are **postmarked on or before April 19, 2016**. The Registrar Of Voter’s Official Certification is expected prior to the City Council’s May 18, 2016 regularly scheduled meeting.


Though the election has not yet been certified by the Registrar Of Voters, local media sources have called the election results in favor of the proponents of Measure X. The City of Pacific Grove has acknowledged the outcome of the election accordingly.

CITY COUNCIL

Major actions taken by the Council at its regular meeting on April 20, 2016 include:

- ❖ Received the Quarterly Budget Report – 3rd Quarter FY 2015-16, the Workers’ Compensation Report – 3rd Quarter FY 15-16, and the Treasurer’s Quarterly Report.
- ❖ Approved the Mayor’s Nomination of Jane Haines to the Administrative Enforcement Hearing Officer Panel for the term of 4/20/16 to 1/31/18.

- ❖ Regarding the Hospitality Improvement District (HID): held a public hearing, approved the annual report, levied the annual assessment, approved the recommended program for the FY 16-17, and authorized the City Manager to execute an agreement with the Chamber of Commerce to administer the approved HID budget.
- ❖ Regarding the Business Improvement District (BID): held a public hearing, approved the annual report, levied the annual assessment, approved the recommended program for FY 16-17 and authorized the City Manager to execute an agreement with the Chamber of Commerce to administer the approved BID budget.
- ❖ Received the FY16-17 Preliminary Budget and Capital Improvement Plan Information and provided further direction to staff.
- ❖ Approved the Employment Agreement with Ben Harvey for the role of City Manager (shown below following his Oath of Office, which was witnessed by the City Council and administered by City Clerk Sandra Kandell).

Written Communication. City Manager Ben Harvey announced the following change regarding the recommended procedure for written communication related to agenda items:

This change will appear on the posted agenda for the regularly scheduled City Council meeting of May 4, 2016.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Emergency Preparedness Presentation - On April 14, 2016, Emergency Services Coordinator David Potter made a presentation to a group of approximately forty on-site apartment property managers from the local area. There was a discussion regarding the types of calls that Monterey Fire Department personnel respond to at residential units and how the on-site managers can assist fire personnel upon their arrival to an emergency. Managers can prepare for emergency personnel by being ready to provide access into apartments or locked gates. Additionally, being familiar with their site and their tenants can assist emergency personnel by directing them to gas shut off valves or in identifying tenants that may not be mobile. Handouts were provided regarding emergency preparedness procedures in the event of natural or other disasters such as earthquakes, tsunamis, winter storms or other large scale events. Steps that on-site managers can take to be prepared include:

- Sign up for emergency notifications at www.alertmontereycounty.org
- Make a plan and prepare for emergencies
- Create first aid and emergency items kits
- Be familiar with your building and tenants
- Ensure fire sprinkler systems, smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms are installed and operational
- Ensure walkways, stairways and paths are clear of obstructions

There was also a review of how and when to shut off utilities as well as what to do before, during or after an emergency. If you are interested in having EOC Coordinator David Potter speak to your group, please contact him at (831) 646-3900.

PUBLIC WORKS

Slurry Seal. Public Works has been continuing to prepare some of our roadways for a road rehabilitation project that we current have out to bid. The project will consist of crack sealing and then the application of a slurry seal over the roadways, and new street markings. City crews have been preparing the roadways that will be treated by grinding down bumps and filling in holes prior to the work commencing by the contractor. The roads selected are recommended for a slurry seal in the pavement assessment that the City had conducted in January. This Fiscal year the City is concentrating on the Del Monte Park neighborhoods, and a few select roads where recent sewer projects had taken place adjacent to lighthouse Avenue (please see attached map). The City will be awarding the project to a contractor at their May 18, 2016 meeting. Work will commence shortly after that meeting.



New Electric Vehicle.

The City's Public Works Department had also received a grant from the Monterey Air District for an electric vehicle (shown in the picture, below). Last week we received the vehicle and now have this in our fleet. It is a great car and is perfect for our town.


