### CITY COUNCIL

Major actions taken by the Council at its regular meeting on April 6, 2016 include:

- ❖ Recognized Debbie Gonzalez as Employee of the Quarter



- ❖ Recognized Amy Lonsinger and Michaela Basanese as Police Department Employees of the Year.
- ❖ Proclaimed April as Fair Housing Month.
- ❖ Received an update from CourseCo.
- ❖ Authorized the City Manager to approve relevant training and experience for Administrative Hearing Officers to satisfy the requirements of Vehicle Code Section 40215.
- ❖ Held second reading of an ordinance approving amendment to the Zoning Code implementing Programs 2.3a, 4.1b and 4.2a of the 2015-2023 Housing Element.
- ❖ Held second reading and adopted an ordinance to amend the PGMC Chapter 23 to add a new Section 23.64.370 related to permitting Home Sharing and adopted the Initial Study/Negative Declaration.
- ❖ Held second reading of an ordinance to amend PGMC 7.40 and 23.64.350 related to Transient Use License for residential property and adopted the Initial Study/Negative Declaration.

- ❖ Council conditionally continued an appeal of a use permit for golf course netting contingent upon discussions and review with PARSAC, the City's third party risk pool administrator.
- ❖ Received the first quarterly report on the progress of the Local Water Project.
- ❖ Received meeting minutes from Commissions, Boards, and Committees.
- ❖ Approved a resolution of intention to levy an assessment for the Hospitality Improvement District (HID) for Fiscal Year 2016-17 and directed staff to publish public hearing notice.

**Emergency Home Repair Loans.** The City of Pacific Grove Housing Division offers Emergency Home Repair Loans of up to \$10,000 to correct emergency health and safety conditions. These loans are provided to income eligible homeowners at a simple 3% interest rate. The loan is secured by a Promissory Note and a Deed of Trust, and is deferred until property transfer or title change. Also available through the Housing Division are loans to replace private sewer lateral lines for homeowners experiencing regular sewer back-ups or overflows. These loans have no income eligibility requirements but have the same provisions as Emergency Loans. **Independent Study Reveals Potential Fiscal Impact of Proposed Project Bella Hotel.** An independent report commissioned by the City of Pacific Grove is available for review on the City's website. The study is intended to estimate the potential cost/revenue balance for the City government of the proposed Project Bella Hotel. The analysis evaluates the proposed project at full development and operation and compares the resulting tax revenues and City service costs to the existing retail use in the American Tin Cannery Building. In preparing the study, the consultant, Applied Development Economics (ADE), met with City staff and received data from local authorities in the tourism industry, including the City of Pacific Grove, Monterey County Convention and Visitor Bureau, the Monterey Bay Aquarium and the Pacific Grove Chamber of Commerce. ADE also met with the project sponsor, Domaine Hospitality Partners, to obtain a detailed description of the proposed Project Bella Hotel.

**Making Forest Avenue and Sunset Drive work better for everyone.** The Pacific Grove Highway 68 Study is looking at ways to improve Forest Avenue and Sunset Drive. The goal is to create a more "complete" corridor—one that works better for different forms of transportation and for people of all ages and abilities. In particular, the study is exploring ways to improve walking and biking on those streets.

In Fall 2015, the study team researched conditions and received input from the public on needs and concerns. Now the team would like to share with you some ideas and design drawings for the corridor. Below are ways to see, and hear, these ideas and to give your thoughts and opinions on them:

**Community Summit.** On April 6, 2016, Monterey Fire Chief Gaudenz Panholzer and Emergency Services Coordinator David Potter participated in a *Community Resiliency Summit* sponsored by the *Monterey County Office of Emergency Services* and the *Resilient Monterey County Partnership*. There were also participants from the community such as business owners, non-profits, education, transportation, and healthcare. The purpose of the summit was to form a collaborative effort to understand how our community can be prepared to recover from an incident and become stronger afterwards. The summit addressed social, economic, natural,

cultural, technical, and organization dimensions of a community and focused efforts on improving everyday resilience of the residents of Monterey County. The group reviewed lessons learned from incidents such as the 2014 Napa earthquake and flooding that took place in the mid-west in 2008. Preparedness such as this allows for planning of essential services to support community needs through resources and self-sufficiency immediately following these types of disasters. Mayor's Proclamation Declaring the Month of April 2016

"Fair Housing Month" in the City of Pacific Grove

**WHEREAS**, the City of Pacific Grove joins the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), California Department of Fair Employment and Housing (DFEH), and other housing agencies in celebrating the anniversary of the National Fair Housing Law, Title V11 of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 each April; and,

**WHEREAS**, adequate housing is a basic need and a right of all people; and,

**WHEREAS**, Federal and California law protects against discrimination based on race, color, religion, sex, national origin, familial status, on the basis of handicap to disabled persons, on marital status, ancestry, source of income, sexual orientation, or any other arbitrary factor; and,

**WHEREAS**, discrimination in housing is against the law and no person shall be discriminated against in the sale, rental, or advertising of residential dwellings, in the provisions of brokerage services and lending services, or in the availability of any residential real estate related transactions; and,

**WHEREAS**, the City encourages and supports fair housing practices in the sales and rental of housing in Pacific Grove, as well as, through the City housing programs; and,

**WHEREAS**, in order to heighten public awareness, the City of Pacific Grove pledges its commitment to improve housing options, and encourages all citizens and community organizations to celebrate the value of harmonious and diverse communities by promoting Fair Housing Law.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, I, Bill Kampe, Mayor of the City of Pacific Grove, do hereby proclaim the month of April 2016, as Fair Housing Month in the City of Pacific Grove.

# FAIR HOUSING

## YOU ARE PROTECTED UNDER CALIFORNIA LAW!

The California Department of Fair Employment and Housing (DFEH) enforces laws that protect you from illegal discrimination and harassment in housing based on your actual or perceived:

- **Race**
- **Color**
- **Religion** (includes all aspects of religious belief, such as religious dress and grooming practices)
- **Sex** (includes pregnancy, childbirth, breastfeeding and related medical conditions)
- **Gender**
- **Gender identity**
- **Gender expression**
- **Sexual orientation**
- **Marital status**
- **National origin** (includes language use restrictions)
- **Ancestry**
- **Familial status** (households with a child or children under age 18)
- **Source of income**
- **Disability** (mental and physical, including HIV/AIDS and cancer)
- **Genetic information** (includes genetic tests or manifestation of a hereditary disease)
- **Age** (limited scope under the *Unruh Civil Rights Act*)

Common fair housing violations, based on the categories listed above, include the following:

- Refusal to sell, rent, or lease housing accommodations
- Denial of a home loan or homeowner's insurance
- Representation that a housing accommodation is not available for inspection, sale, or rental when that accommodation is in fact available
- Provision of inferior terms, conditions, privileges, facilities or services in connection with the housing accommodation
- Sexual harassment involving unwanted sexual advances or requiring sexual favors for housing rights or privileges
- Cancellation or termination of a sale or rental agreement
- Refusal to permit reasonable accommodations, at the disabled tenant's expense, when necessary to accommodate a disability
- Refusal to make reasonable accommodations in housing rules, policies, practices, or services where necessary to afford a disabled person equal opportunity to use and enjoy a dwelling
- Discriminatory policies, practices, terms, or conditions that result in unequal access to housing or housing-related services

It also is illegal for cities, counties, or local government agencies to make zoning or land-use decisions or policies that unlawfully discriminate against you based on the categories listed above.

## WHAT THE DFEH DOES

- **Enforces** the Fair Employment and Housing Act, the Unruh Civil Rights Act, and the Ralph Civil Rights Act
- **Investigates complaints** of discrimination, harassment, retaliation, and hate violence in employment, housing and public accommodations
- **Mediates complaints of discrimination** to resolve disputes between parties involving alleged violations of the laws the DFEH enforces
- **Files and prosecutes lawsuits** against those who violate the laws the DFEH enforces
- **Educates Californians** about the laws prohibiting discrimination, harassment, retaliation and hate violence in employment, housing, and public accommodations

**You have the right to complain about housing discrimination!** If you believe you have experienced illegal discrimination or harassment in housing, you can explore filing a complaint with DFEH by taking the following steps:

- File a complaint online at [www.dfeh.ca.gov](http://www.dfeh.ca.gov) or contact us at our toll-free number (800) 884-1684;
- Provide specific facts about the incident;
- Provide copies of documents that support the charges in your complaint;
- Keep records and documents about the complaint, such as rent receipts, applications, and other potential proof of discrimination.

Complaints must be filed within one year of the last act of discrimination/harassment/retaliation or, for victims who are under the age of 18, not later than one year after the victim's eighteenth birthday.

If your complaint is accepted, the DFEH will conduct an impartial investigation. The DFEH is a neutral fact-finding agency and does not represent complaints or respondents. The DFEH's role is to determine if the law has been violated. Whenever possible, the DFEH will assist both parties to resolve the complaint. Examples of resolution could include:

- Making previously denied housing available;
- Compensation for losses and emotional distress;
- Training and policy changes to prevent future discrimination;
- Other actions to eliminate the effects of discrimination.

If the DFEH is unable to resolve the complaint, and there is sufficient evidence to establish a violation of the law, the DFEH may litigate the matter in civil court.
